We've had visiting clergy, a baptism and confirmation, a full survey done on the church by our new architect, a 'Last night of the Proms' to rival the Albert Hall, and an absolutely terrific Patronal Festival, to name but a few! There's apalpable sense of good cheer and optimism at All Saints as we see change continuing to happen.

We always love to welcome visiting clergy, and what a joy it was when Bishop Michael Langrishcame to baptise and confirm Josh and Jade on the 20th August, with their three boys as part of our church family. We'll be looking forward to more visits from Bishop Michael later in the year, as we shallfrom Fr Darren Smith, whose heart was well and truly stolen by baby Esther after Mass on Sunday 10th September.

In fact September was a significant month in many different ways, not least of which was the visit from our new architect, Jonathan Saunders on Friday 8thto survey the church in preparation for the hugely important quinquennial report. We are so grateful to Alan Yeates and Terry for their extensive background work informing and liaising with Jonathan Saunders.

The first statement of the report's summary read thus:

'The church is in excellent overall condition as a consequence of committed daily care'. We all know who carries out that daily care, often far from glamorous, and our heartfelt thanks go to Janice for her constant nurture of our church and halls, and to the flower arrangers who bless All Saints with beautiful displays.



Just a day after Jonathan's survey the church was filled with people, flags and stirring music as we sang 'Land of Hope and Glory' and all the Proms favourites,

thanks to Paul Beechey, the Weston Light Orchestra, Richard Lennox and soloist Zoe Maitland. We were pleased to raise £743 for church funds and £100 from the raffle to support the Luhimba project in Tanzania, one of our three main outreach charities.





These beautiful flowers enhanced our Harvest Festival celebration on 1st October. Harvest Festivals in churches throughout the land have changed beyond recognition now, as Father Brendan mentioned in his sermon. Now, more than ever before, we're aware of our duty to protect the natural world as we

witness the damage done when greed and profit eclipse morality.




We're also keenly aware of the desperate need in Weston to support families struggling to keep pace with rising costs, so we were delighted to be able to collect 87.40kg of donations for the foodbank, thanks to the generosity of our congregation, and to Janice, who loaded her car and delivered it all to Weston Foodbank.

Our outreach takes many forms, and the weekly coffee church on Wednesday mornings continues to draw people in for informal worship and fellowship. We're very grateful to Fr Chris, who plays for us each week, all from memory, and to the leaders who prepare some very interesting talks, each with a unique perspective.

White and gold adorned a full church on our Patronal Festival at the end of October, when we were joined by the Revd Canon Nicola Stanley, Canon Pastor and Vice Dean of Bristol Cathedral, who preached a wonderful

It was lovely to be able to get to know Nicola after Mass, and we hope to see her again soon.

Our concert season continues to bring people into the church, and to contribute to the general fund. Following the 'Last Night' we enjoyed 'An English Serenade', which saw the Costanzi Consort join forces with Trinity Singers for a splendid evening of English music, from Byrd to Vaughan Williams. We have Vocalise's concert of Christmas songs to look forward to on the 8th December, Andrea Monk's piano pupils on the 10th, and an afternoon concert given by Weston Choral-'Sure on this Shining Night' on the 16th. One vital element of a healthy church is the pursuit of spiritual



growth, which arises from discussion, prayer and reflection, and on Saturday 16th September Father Gary Ecclestone led the PCC in an inspiring conversation, beginning with Mass and then, taking the 8 essential qualities of a healthy church as a

starting point, focussing on All Saints' church- ourachievements so

far, and the challenges still facing us. We're very grateful to Fr Gary for helping us to develop our vision of mission and outreach. Also grateful for the delicious sandwiches and fruit provided by Fr Brendan, which rounded off the morning! We now welcome Joan Beer as joint church warden with Ray Armstrong.

This newsletter gives us an opportunity to express our thanks to all those who enhance our worship, run the office, read our Scriptures, volunteer on our various rotas, help out with cleaning or clearing away, or simply pray for us. Your support is much valued. It's easy to forget to thank people in the day-to-day bustle of life, so here's an accolade to Father Stuart and Father Andrew Allen, who continue to provide uplifting Eucharistic services for us, to the servers, the choir and Robert. And of course to Father Brendan, whose commitment to the spiritual health and growth of All Saints is unequivocal. Thank you, all of you!
